Reflection

"Whoever accepts my commandments and obeys them is the one who loves me." Jn 14: 21

This was the parting advice of Jesus to His disciples "Keep working on Love". If I asked Jesus how His parting advice applied to me right now in my life, how might He answer me? What is the most loving thing we can do faced with the present reality of being in lockdown and in a socially distancing situation. Many people are there who do respond to the needs of their neighbours with courageous and compassionate actions. Health professionals tasked with the caring for the sick, police officers, supermarket staff, are to name but a few. The response the communities and individuals do are creative and consoling. But to many of us, in our own context it will be less obvious. It may be challenging to discover that the most loving course of action for us at the moment, is to protect our own health and bodies, especially if we are in that 'at risk' category, or to separate ourselves and our families physically from our communities and those we most love in order to "Break the Chain" of the Virus spread. And that will be 'a sacrificial love in action'. This is called "Passion" an action being 'done unto' rather than doing for others. Let us join the passion of Our Lord, as we are called into a situation of lockdown and socially being distanced, our Love in Action!

The readings for the last few Sundays have been about the Resurrection, but today's Gospel takes us back in time to an event in Jesus' life before his Passion. Jesus tells his disciples that he is going to prepare a place for them in his Father's house. He promises that where he is going, his disciples will be able to follow. Thomas, who will later doubt the disciples' reports that they have seen the Risen Lord, contradicts Jesus by saying that the disciples don't know where Jesus is going or how to get there. Jesus explains that he himself is the way, the truth, and the life. In knowing and loving Jesus, the disciples now love God the Father.

Philip then makes a request that challenges Jesus' words. Philip wants Jesus to show the Father to the disciples. Recall that Jesus has just told his disciples, "If you know me, then you will also know my Father. From now on you do know him and have seen him." As a good teacher, Jesus responds to Philip by repeating and elaborating on what he has just told the disciples: they have seen and known Jesus, so they have seen and known the Father. Then Jesus offers another reassurance about his departure: because of faith in God and in Jesus, the disciples will do the work that Jesus has done and more.

The connection between Jesus and his Father, between Jesus' work and the work of the Father, is made clear in today's Gospel. Jesus is in the Father, and God the Father is in Jesus. As God spoke his name to Moses, "I am," so too Jesus speaks his name to his disciples: "I am the way and the truth and the life."

The revelation of the Trinity is completed in the passage that follows today's reading, and it is the Gospel for next Sunday. Because Jesus goes away, the Father will send in Jesus' name the Advocate, the Holy Spirit, who will continue the work of the Father and of Jesus.

CAFOD, our Catholic Agency for Overseas Development, launched its coronavirus emergency appeal on 30 April.

Coronavirus (Covid-19) has now spread worldwide, with confirmed cases in many countries where CAFOD works. The effects of coronavirus on

developing countries are likely to be devastating. Many countries have very weak healthcare systems and will not be able to cope. Families without enough to eat and without access to clean water, possibly living with other diseases, will be particularly vulnerable to coronavirus. It is not just a public health emergency. Many of the world's most vulnerable people will lose their jobs and be unable to support their families. The poorest and most marginalised communities, working hard to transform their lives, will be pushed further into poverty.

CAFOD is adapting its programmes to help manage the risk of coronavirus in communities and working with local Church aid agencies on the frontline of this crisis. They are already working to get food to where it is needed most; to improve hygiene, handwashing and sanitation in communities and households; producing radio messages, posters and leaflets in local languages on risks and prevention; and training community volunteers to carry out awareness campaigns. Winston Churchill on VE Day

On this, the 75th Anniversary of VE Day, some of our parishioners share their memories.

JOSEPH DALE was in the middle of the North Atlantic on VE day, aboard a rather decrepit merchant ship. They heard the news but had no provisions for any real celebration. They had become separated from the main convoy and the day following VE day were approached by a Royal Navy Corvette, checking to see if they were ok. The crew of the Corvette asked what their position was when the announcement came through and they duly gave the coordinates. It appeared that they had missed by half an hour the opportunity to accept the surrender of an enemy U boat. The crew on Joseph's ship felt that "The U Boat had scarpared because they would have had to tow us to port, we were in such bad shape!
