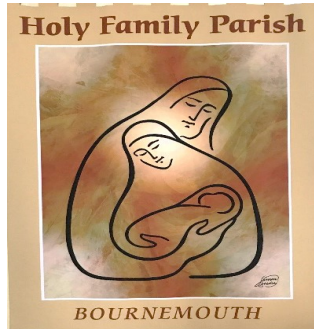

GOSPEL REFLECTION

This attractive and delicate story is the story of the journey to faith in the risen Christ. It occurs in any Christian instruction and especially in the Eucharist. Formed from instruction based on the scriptures, and then brought to its fulfilment in the sacrament.

The two disciples start off deep in depression and disappointment. But they are open minded and willing to learn as the Stranger explains to them from scripture the meaning of events. Their hearts burn within them and the Stranger's words but their eyes remained closed. It is only in the sacramental meal that they recognise the risen Christ.

The Eucharist is a sacrament of initiation, bringing us to the intimate, personal encounter with Christ. Once they have been enlightened and have learnt the profound meaning of events, the truth of the scripture and resurrection then the disciples return to the Holy City and carry on their own Christian apostolate by spreading the news of the resurrection.

This is the shape of the Christian vocation which we all receive to assimilate and pass on the meaning of Christ's resurrection

In today's gospel, the disciples respond both to God's word ... " Were not our hearts burning inside us as He explained the scriptures"?. And they responded to God's sign (Sacrament):"

They had come to know Him in the breaking of the bread".

Our growth in faith is made through the ministry of the God's Word (first part of Mass); (Bible readings and explanation of it in Homily) and comes to its fulfilment in the celebration of the Eucharist – A sacramental (signifying) meal. A Christian can know a great deal about Our Lord without knowing Him as a person! Let us make every Sunday worship, a personal encounter with the Lord in both scriptures and the Sacrament (The Eucharist).

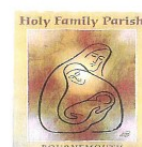

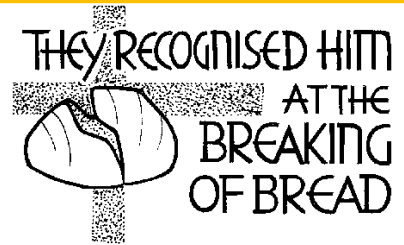

Responsorial Psalm, *Psalms 16:1-2, 5, 7-8, 9-10, 11*

¹ [In a quiet voice Of David] Protect me, O God, in you is my refuge.

² To Yahweh I say, 'You are my Lord, my happiness is in none

⁵ My birthright, my cup is Yahweh; you, you alone, hold my lot secure.

⁷ I bless Yahweh who is my counsellor, even at night my heart instructs me.

⁸ I keep Yahweh before me always, for with him at my right hand, nothing can shake me.

⁹ So my heart rejoices, my soul delights, my body too will rest secure,

¹⁰ for you will not abandon me to Sheol, you cannot allow your faithful servant to see the abyss.

¹¹ You will teach me the path of life, unbounded joy in your presence, at your right hand delight for ever.

Gospel, *Luke 24:13-35*

¹³ Now that very same day, two of them were on their way to a village called Emmaus, seven miles from Jerusalem, ¹⁴ and they were talking together about all that had happened. ¹⁵ And it happened that as they were talking together and discussing it, Jesus himself came up and walked by their side; ¹⁶ but their eyes were prevented from recognising him.

¹⁷ He said to them, 'What are all these things that you are discussing as you walk along?' They stopped, their faces downcast.

¹⁸ Then one of them, called Cleopas, answered him, 'You must be the only person staying in Jerusalem who does not know the things that have been happening there these last few days.'

¹⁹ He asked, 'What things?' They answered, 'All about Jesus of Nazareth, who showed himself a prophet powerful in action and speech before God and the whole people; ²⁰ and how our chief priests and our leaders handed him over to be sentenced to death, and had him crucified. ²¹ Our own hope had been that he would be the one to set Israel free. And this is not all: two whole days have now gone by since it all happened; ²² and some women from our group have astounded us: they went to the tomb in the early morning, ²³ and when they could not find the body, they came back to tell us they had seen a vision of angels who declared he was alive.

²⁴ Some of our friends went to the tomb and found everything exactly as the women had reported, but of him they saw nothing.'

²⁵ Then he said to them, 'You foolish men! So slow to believe all that the prophets have said!

²⁶ Was it not necessary that the Christ should suffer before entering into his glory?'

²⁷ Then, starting with Moses and going through all the prophets, he explained to them the passages throughout the scriptures that were about himself.

²⁸ When they drew near to the village to which they were going, he made as if to go on;

²⁹ but they pressed him to stay with them saying, 'It is nearly evening, and the day is almost over.' So he went in to stay with them.

³⁰ Now while he was with them at table, he took the bread and said the blessing; then he broke it and handed it to them.

³¹ And their eyes were opened and they recognised him; but he had vanished from their sight.

³² Then they said to each other, 'Did not our hearts burn within us as he talked to us on the road and explained the scriptures to us?'

³³ They set out that instant and returned to Jerusalem. There they found the Eleven assembled together with their companions, ³⁴ who said to them,

'The Lord has indeed risen and has appeared to Simon.'

³⁵ Then they told their story of what had happened on the road and how they had recognised him at the breaking of bread.
