The Second Sunday of Lent

First reading Genesis 22:1-2,9-13,15-18 ·

God put Abraham to the test. 'Abraham, Abraham' he called. 'Here I am' he replied. 'Take your son,' God said 'your only child Isaac, whom you love, and go to the land of Moriah. There you shall offer him as a burnt offering, on a mountain I will point out to you.'

Gospel Mark 9:2-10

Jesus took with him Peter and James and John and led them up a high mountain where they could be alone by them-selves. There in their presence he was transfigured: his clothes became dazzlingly white, whiter than any earthly bleacher could make them. Elijah appeared to them with Moses; and they were talking with Jesus. Then Peter spoke to Jesus: 'Rabbi,' he said 'it is wonderful for us to be here; so let us make three tents, one for you, one for Moses and one for Elijah.' He did not know what to say; they were so frightened. And a cloud came, covering them in shadow; and there came a voice from the cloud, 'This is my Son, the Beloved. Listen to him.' Then suddenly, when they looked round, they saw no one with them any more but only Jesus.

As they came down from the mountain he warned them to tell no one what they had seen, until after the Son of Man had risen from the dead. They observed the warning faithfully, though among themselves they discussed what 'rising from the dead' could mean.



He has asked us to reflect on the documents of Second Vatican Council and on Lord's Prayer: We will be putting forth bits of reflections on the Lord's Prayer every week.

The Lord's Prayer. The Lord's Prayer highlights our new inheritance in Baptism, calling God "Our Father". We are presented with two truths: First, The loving Fatherhood of God inviting us intimacy and communion, second, Hallowing the name of God to respect and worship His greatness and His majesty. Contemporary society has a sense that fatherhood is repressive and problematic. Hence a derogatory usage of patriarchy. Unfortunately, it is the case that some fathers are no more that "begetters", having little to do with the children they help to bring into the world. We need to rediscover the identity of what it means to be true loving father.

Reflection: "Jesus took Peter ,James, and John up a mountain. Then a cloud appeared and covered them with a shadow and a voice from the cloud said "This is my own dear Son...Hear Him" (Mk.9:7)

There is a connection between this mountain even on Mount Tabor and another mountain event at Mount Olivet. On Mount Tabor, Peter James and John saw Jesus in a moment of ecstasy, when His divinity was revealed in a privileged way. On Mount Olivet, the same three Apostles saw Jesus in His moment of agony, when His humanity was revealed in a privileged way. The two events are complimentary in that they reveal total Jesus in a total way: True God and true Man. How do I tend to relate to Jesus in my prayer life – more as God or man?



ST DAVID—Patron of Wales—1st March

St David was born in the year 500. According to legend, he was born on a Pembrokeshire clifftop during a fierce storm. He became a renowned preacher, founding monastic settlements and churches in Wales, Brittany and southwest England – including, possibly, the abbey at Glaston-bury. The most famous miracle associated with St David took place when he was preaching to a large crowd in Llanddewi Brefi. When people at the back complained that they could not hear him, the ground on which he stood rose up to form a hill. A white dove, sent by God, settled on his shoulder. St David died on 1 March 589. His last words to his followers came from a sermon he gave on the previous Sunday: 'Be joyful, keep the faith, and do the

little things that you have heard and seen me do.' The phrase 'Gwnewch y pethau bychain mewn bywyd' - 'Do the little things in life' - is still a well-known maxim in Wales.
