The very last sentence of the Gospel speaks of their lack of faith. What was this lack of faith? They recognized in Jesus an extraordinary wisdom and a power of miracles, but this seems not to have been enouah.

What more was needed? Faith is not the acceptance of a set of propositions, 'I believe that the earth circles the sun', etc. It is putting all my trust in God as my only hope. Abraham, the model of faith, went out into the desert, leaving everything on which he relied, everything that made him what he was. He even trusted God to get him out of the unbearable fix when God told him to sacrifice his only son.


The townsfolk of Nazareth presumably thought they knew Jesus through and through. They were prepared to acknowledge his wisdom and his miracles. But they were not prepared to go further and see that God was at work in him, that he was the manifestation of God among them.

It is all very well to admire Jesus, to think him a fine teacher and a heroic, honourable man, who gave everything for his high ideals; but unless we see God in him, the divine transcendence of all that is human, he cannot work the miracle of taking us to himself.

Mark 6:1-6a Reasons Not to Believe in Jesus The Gospel of Mark: Called to Follow

People couldn't accept the ordinariness of Jesus - that he grew up in a normal family which was named and well-known in Nazareth. Sometimes we find it hard to see the grace of God near to us, under our noses as it were. In the ordinariness of life and of love, of misunderstanding and hurt, of care and compassion, the grace of God and the love of God are active and alive.

Reflection : Jesus went to His home in Nazareth only to be rejected by His own people. Jesus said to them " A prophet is respected everywhere except in His own home town and by his relatives and his family" (Mk 6:4) The Olympics dates from Greek games held on the plains of Olympia in 776 BC. Ancient towns often honoured victors by erecting a statue in their honour. A Greek story concerns a town that honoured such a local hero. The hero's rival was so envious that one night he rocked the statue back and forth and toppled it. It fell at an odd angle, crushing him under its might weight. That story dramatizes the boomerang effect envy can have. The cancer of envy is often a factor in why prophets are not respected in their hometowns. To what extend is envy a factor in my life and work? What might I do to lesson its impact?
